### Chief Minister Health Insurance Scheme (CMHIS)

Financial issues, the worries of hospitalization everyone faces when suffering from illness or infirmities.

The State Government instituted the Chief Minister Health Insurance Scheme (CMHIS) Nagaland to relieve financial hardships due to hospitalization expenses and to aid in making medical accessible to all. CMHIS is one among the first State-specific welfare schemes, wherein citizens of the State are entitled to free and cashless treatment for various ailments. As part of the scheme, hospitalization expenses are mitigated and easy access to quality and affordable healthcare is provided further accelerating the progress towards Universal Health Coverage (UHC)<sup>2</sup>.

The Scheme is a step towards fulfilling, "The Nagaland Sustainable Development Goal Vision 2030," which states that "by 2030, Nagaland will ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all ages by providing equitable, affordable and quality healthcare services to the people of the State."

CMHIS is implemented in convergence with the Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana (AB PM-JAY), which is a flagship programme of the Government of India. The converged scheme is known as the "Ayushman Bharat Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana - Chief Minister Health Insurance Scheme" or the "AB PM-JAY CMHIS".
















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# Chief Minister's Micro Finance Initiative (CMMFI)

There are many people in Nagaland who want to start a business but are facing lack of access to capital and resources. Cultivating the spirit of entrepreneurship and innovation is one of the means to address the problems of unemployment and to reduce the burden of excess government staff. Nagaland is predominantly an agrarian state with 45% of its working population engaged in agriculture activities. Since some of the poorer sections of the society may still find difficulty in gainful meaningful employment in the agriculture, allied and small enterprise sectors, an omnibus scheme under the name and nomenclature of Chief Minister's Micro Finance Initiative (CMMFI) is introduced to give them the opportunity of availing affordable credit for various start-up initiatives. A total of Rs 65 crore has been allocated for this scheme, which provides subsidies and interest subventions to eligible agricultural and allied activities, such as processing units, Micro Small and Medium Enterprises etc.<sup>4</sup>

Microfinance or microcredit is basically a type of banking service provided to low-income individuals or groups.<sup>5</sup> Nagaland has also adopted this financial innovation that has emerged as a powerful tool for promoting financial inclusion and poverty alleviation. It involves providing small-scale financial services, such as loans, savings and insurance to individuals who typically lack access to traditional banking systems.

### **OBJECTIVES OF THE SCHEME**

To increase farmer's income, encourage self-employment and entrepreneurship development, inculcate a sense of credit discipline, boost private enterprise and improve the agri-marketing network and infrastructure in our State


### About IDAN:

The Investment and Development Authority of Nagaland (IDAN) was set up in June, 2018 in accordance with the Chief Minister of Nagaland's vision to attract investment to the State. Acting as an investment promotion and facilitation agency (IPA), IDAN aims to explore, promote and facilitate all kinds of investment opportunities relating to infrastructure and socio-economic development in Nagaland.

By leveraging the strength of the government departments through effective networking, IDAN strives to transform Nagaland into a prominent achiever of Sustainable Development Goals.

### Forest & Biodiversity Management in the Himalaya, Nagaland Project (FBMP)

Imagine a forest as a grand library, each species a unique book and biodiversity management as the librarian ensuring that no story is lost

In the heart of our forests lies the blueprint for a thriving planet and biodiversity management is the art of conserving this inheritance for generations to come. The Himalayan region stretches across multiple countries, including India, Nepal, Bhutan, China, and others. The region has immense ecological significance, housing a wide range of biodiversity. It also plays a crucial role in regulating the climate and water resources of the Indian subcontinent and beyond. As a result, forest and biodiversity management in the Himalayas is essential to conserve its unique ecosystems and address various environmental challenges through community based efforts.<sup>6</sup>

Nagaland is a part of the Eastern Himalayan range and conservation efforts are underway with specific strategies tailored to the region's distinctive ecological characteristics.

FBMP, a part of the Government of Germany's Financial Cooperation (FC) with India, signed in 2016, concerns the sustainable and effective management of forests and biodiversity in the State of Nagaland. It is focused on the provision of support to Community Conservation Areas (CCAs) in the State.<sup>7</sup>

By integrating traditional knowledge with modern conservation practices, Nagaland aims to safeguard its natural heritage for future generations.

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# Fostering Climate Resilient Upland Farming Systems (FOCUS) in the North East - Nagaland Chapter

In the face of climate uncertainty and changing landscapes, resilient farming systems are the bedrock upon which our future harvests stand firm.

Upland farming refers to agricultural practices in areas with higher elevations, often characterized by sloping lands and challenging climatic conditions. Nagaland, known for its diverse agriculture and hilly terrain is synonymous with upland farming.

The farmers in the State of Nagaland have been using shifting cultivation system known as *jhum*. Jhum cultivation, also known as slash-and-burn agriculture, is an ancient traditional farming practice<sup>8</sup> used in various parts of the world, especially in the hilly and forested regions of Southeast Asia, Central and South America and Africa.<sup>9</sup> It is a method of farming that involves clearing a patch of land by cutting down and burning vegetation, cultivating crops for a few years until the soil fertility declines, and then moving on to a new plot, while the previous one is left to regenerate naturally.<sup>10</sup>

Although the jhum cultivation has met the needs of rural communities as a source of food, fodder and energy, it has become unsustainable due to increasing population, soil fertility degradation, topsoil erosion, changing climate patterns and a shift in focus to cultivate more of high-value crops for increased incomes.

Since 60% of the area under food grain cultivation in these regions is covered by the *jhum* system, there is a great need for development of appropriate and sustainable farming technologies and practices. As a result, the FOCUS project is designed to address these challenges by:<sup>11</sup>

- Educating farmers to opt for better *jhum* cultivation practices that will be more productive and sustainable
- Assisting *jhumia* households to adopt alternative farming systems, particularly settled farming.

## G20: The Nagaland Chapter

The Group of Twenty, commonly referred to as the G20, is an international forum that brings together the world's major economies to address global economic and financial issues. Established in 1999, the G20 consists of 19 individual countries and the European Union, representing a diverse array of nations from different regions, each with a significant impact on the global economy.

The G20 Presidency rotates annually and India took over the leadership of the G20 from Indonesia in 2023. The Presidency involved hosting a series of high-level meetings and summits, culminating in the annual G-20 Summit where leaders from member countries gathered to discuss and coordinate on a wide range of global economic and financial issues.

As a result of India's Presidency, Nagaland also got the opportunity to host Business 20 (B20) from April 04-06, 2023. The Business 20 (B20) is the official G20 dialogue forum with the global business community. The B20 leads the process of helping elicit the views of the global business leaders on issues of global economic and trade governance and speaks in a single voice for the entire G20 business community. About 120 delegates from G20, European and guest countries attended the Summit. The focus of the Summit was on the potential of the State's agriculture and allied sector and the food processing industry. It also included other important themes such as tourism and IT accompanied by various discussions and plenary sessions.

### Some activities of B20 held in Nagaland:

- Representation: Representatives from various sectors and industries, including multinational corporations, small and medium enterprises (SMEs), and business associations convened on important global issues.
- **Recommendations:** Policy recommendations and proposals on issues related to global economic growth, trade, investment and other business-related matters were proposed. These recommendations are then presented to the G20 leaders and State Government for consideration.
- Working Groups and Task Forces: Organised working groups and task forces that focused on specific policy areas, such as finance, infrastructure, digitalization, and sustainability. These groups collaborate to develop concrete proposals for the G20 and host country.
- Engagement with G20 Leaders: The B20 engaged with the G20 leaders presenting its recommendations and engaging in discussions to influence global economic policies.
- Global Challenges: Addressed a range of global challenges, including economic development, job creation, innovation and sustainable development.

Known for its lively atmosphere and a deep sense of unity, the Hornbill Festival has become a major attraction for tourists, providing them with a captivating insight into the fascinating Naga way of life.

# Horticulture

Horticulture is the art of orchestrating nature's symphony, where skilled hands cultivate the earth's treasures, the plants; transforming the land into a lush, living masterpiece with a strong aesthetic appeal.

Horticulture is a branch of agricultural science that focuses on the cultivation, production and management of plants, particularly fruits, vegetables, ornamental plants and medicinal herbs. Nagaland being an agri-community with over 70% of the population engaged in farming activities, horticulture naturally becomes a focus sector of the State.

The State Government's Department of Horticulture continues to impart scientific-technical support and training to the farmers. The steady success of the department can be seen in the achievements of the farming community: 12

- Two farmers under the aid of the Department was awarded the *Large Cardamom Productivity Award* during the International Buyer Seller Meet and Spices Conclave for Northeastern Region on 1st July, 2022 at Guwahati, Assam.
- Three Farmers Producers Company (FPC) namely-Molsang Organic Pineapple Producer Company Limited, Phek Organic Large Cardamom Producer Company Limited and Chansu Organic Kiwi Producer Company Limited scheme were awarded with the *Horticulture* Value Chain Award 2022 on November 1, 2022 in Pune.

During the year 2022, the Department also crossed another milestone with the establishment of 11 Sub-Divisional Horticulture Offices at Pfutsero, Meluri, Mangkolemba, Tuli, Pughoboto, Seyochung, Tobu, Tening, Ralan, Sanis and Chiephobozou in order to provide better services to the farmers.<sup>13</sup>


## Khonoma Village, Kohima District


Longwa village is a culturally rich village located in the Mon district of Nagaland, which shares the border with the nation of Myanmar. The village is primarily inhabited by the Konyak Naga tribe, one of the prominent and bravest tribes in Nagaland. They are known for their very unique customs and tradition like distinctive tattoos, facial piercings and unique attires. Long ago, the tribe was known for its ferocious headhunting traditions and remnants of this history such as the skulls of animals and humans can still be found in the village.

What makes Longwa particularly interesting is that it straddles the international border between India and Myanmar. In fact, the Angh's (Chief) house in the village is divided by the border, with one half of it in India and the other half in Myanmar. This special geographical feature has made Longwa a popular tourist destination.

It is also known for its skilled artisans who create traditional Naga handicrafts. These include intricately designed spears, guns machetes, wooden carvings, jewelries and woven textiles. Visitors can purchase these items as souvenirs





## Mithun: State Animal

The enigmatic forest-dweller of the Eastern Himalayas, epitomizing the mystical allure of untamed wilderness and the cultural richness of the region.

**M**ithun is a type of a large domesticated cattle that holds cultural and traditional significance for the people of Nagaland. It has symbolic meanings in rituals and ceremonies and acquiring the animal is considered a valuable asset. The animal is characterized by its unique appearance, with distinctive features such as a hump on its back and large, curved horns. It is also closely associated with cultural identity in Nagaland.

It is a ruminant species belonging to the family bovidae and assumed to be the domesticated form of wild gaur (*Bos gaurus*), which is indigenous to the Eastern Himalayas. The cattle is distributed in Northeast India, Bangladesh, Myanmar and in the Yunnan province of China.<sup>20</sup>

The National Research Centre (NRC) on Mithun was established at Medziphema in the Chümoukedima district of Nagaland under the aegis of the Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR), to provide impetus on the research work on mithun.

ICAR-NRC on mithun has been playing key roles in the conservation, breeding and health management of this magnificent species.<sup>21</sup> The scientists of the Institute, in the past 28 years, have generated significant scientific information, developed many farmers' friendly technologies and formulated a package of practices for making mithun husbandry a sustainable commercial venture.



### Naga Cucumber: Sweet Cucumber

The hydrating superheroes of salads, the unsung champions of refreshing summer snacks, and the secret ingredient that turns ordinary water into a spa-worthy experience.

Naga cucumber is recognized for its sweetness and unique green colour with a tinge of yellow. In terms of health benefits, it is rich in potassium with low calories. There is now a total of four Geographical Indication (GI) tags for Nagaland, with the most recent being "Naga Cucumber". The agricultural product's application for a GI Tag was filed by the North Eastern Regional Agricultural Marketing Corporation Limited (NERAMAC) on December 10, 2018 and it was certified on September 14, 2021.<sup>22</sup>

Cucumber has been traditionally cultivated by Naga farmers in their jhum fields as a mixed crop mainly during the Kharif season (April-May). It is one of the important component crops in the jhum cultivation and is primarily grown as a cash crop along with paddy. However, the "off-season" cucumbers from different districts of Nagaland, especially from the Mokokchung district, have gained much popularity and has become a cultivation trend amongst the farmers in the district. Some tribes like Konyak also grow cucumber throughout the year, by the seed-to-seed method, depending on the soil type.

Naga Cucumbers are produced organically and can be grown during summer and winter seasons.

### 1 S Naga Mircha

Where heat meets delight: Next time you are looking for a way to add some fiery enthusiasm to your appetite, reach for the Naga Mircha! The famous Naga Mircha or Naga King Chilli is a naturally occurring chilli pepper species in Bangladesh and North East India, and more specifically in Nagaland, Assam and Manipur. It has a sweet and slightly tart flavour, followed by slight undertones of woody, smoky flavours. The Government of India has awarded the GI Tag to the Naga Mircha in 2008,<sup>23</sup> alleviating the adverse financial effects on the native or first-growers/creators, who were finding it difficult to prove that their product is authentic.<sup>24</sup>

The heat level of this chilli is extremely high, measuring around 800,000 to over 1,000,000 Scoville Heat Units (SHU). For comparison, a standard jalapeño pepper typically ranges from 2,500 to 8,000 SHU. As a result, the extreme spiciness of Naga Mircha makes it a popular ingredient in hot sauces, spicy foods, and even for creating pepper-based products like pepper spray. In Nagaland and other Naga inhabited areas, the chilli is often used in pickles, chutneys, and various local dishes.

The Naga Tree Tomato also known as "*Tamarillo*" <sup>25</sup> is a plant species that produces fruit resembling a tomato and is indigenously cultivated in Nagaland. In spite of the fact that it is technically a shrub, it is referred to as "tree tomato" because it can grow into a tree-like structure. The plant is known for its fast growth rate and for its ability to produce fruit relatively quickly after planting. In terms of agroclimatic conditions, it requires a sub-tropical or mild temperate climate and a well-drained soil to thrive. It can also be grown in regions where citrus crops are cultivated. In Nagaland, the tomato is usually grown in kitchen gardens, orchards, or even in pots.

This GI-Tagged <sup>26</sup> tomato is known for its unique shape and has a tangy-tarty taste. On the palate, the tamarillo's taste is a combination of passion fruit and piquant tomato. It also comes fortified with minerals and vitamins and is a favourite ingredient for local dishes.

# Maga-Integrated Settled Farming (N-ISF)

Integrated settled farming unites tradition and innovation, cultivating both crops and communities, where the roots of sustainable agriculture run deep.

Integrated farming practices involve the strategic combination of various agricultural activities within a single farming system to maximize efficiency and sustainability. This approach assimilates crops, livestock and other components, such as aquaculture and agroforestry, to create a balanced and interconnected ecosystem. By diversifying production and utilizing the synergies between different elements, integrated farming practices can enhance resource utilization, reduce environmental impacts and improve overall farm resilience. These holistic approaches to agriculture promote long-term sustainability while also addressing food security and economic stability for farming communities.

To achieve the goals of generating employment, remunerative farming, doubling farmers' income, bringing them into gainful employment and by taking advantage of the rich social capital present, and considering all the factors affecting production, the Naga-Integrated Settled Farming (N-ISF) model project was developed. This model has already started at Boke- Botsa under Kohima district and soon will be replicated in other districts.

The N-ISF can be broadly defined as a business model towards revitalizing the production system through integrated farming at the farmers' fields by providing infrastructural support and organizing the farmers/producers into groups for aggregation of products with linkages to market. It aims to ensure a sustainable livelihood for the farmers and transforming the present subsistence agriculture to commercial and sustainable agriculture.

# Nagaland Bamboo Mission

The mysteries of the Orient are riddled in the dance of the bamboo in the wind

And when the wind blows its ancient rhythm, the crackling yet calming sounds of bamboo whispers the secrets of resilience

So step into the wilderness of Nagaland and let the song of the bamboo knocking into one another welcome you.

**B**amboo, known as a "Giant Grass", is one of the fastest growing and highest yielding renewable natural resources. It constitutes one of the most important resources of Nagaland. Through the centuries, the Naga people have used bamboo and its products for a variety of purposes. As an integral part of Naga life, it has been used for everything from cutting umbilical cords to wrapping the dead for burial. It still continues to play a major role in the life of the people as agricultural tools, shelter, food, and livelihood implements.

This versatile resource has many applications for the Nagas:

- 1. **Housing**: It is often used as a popular construction material to build the framework, walls and roofs of traditional Naga homes.
- 2. **Handicrafts**: Skilled artisans in Nagaland create a wide range of products, including baskets, mats, hats, and musical instruments from bamboo.
- 3. **Tools and Weapons**: Historically, Nagas used bamboo to make tools and weapons such as spears, knives and hunting traps.
- 4. **Bamboo Furniture**: These include tables, chairs and storage units
- 5. **Musical Instruments**: Traditional Naga musical instruments like flutes and drums are made from bamboo.
- 6. **Fishing and Hunting**: Bamboo is used to create fishing traps, nets and hunting equipment.
- 7. **Storage**: Bamboo baskets and containers are commonly used for storing grains, vegetables and other items.
- 8. **Bamboo Shoots**: Bamboo shoots are an essential part of the Naga diet, used in various traditional dishes.
- 9. **Livelihoods**: The bamboo industry provides employment and income to many Naga communities, particularly in rural areas where traditional bamboo craftsmanship is prevalent.


- 10. **Erosion Control**: Nagas have also understood the significance of bamboos in soil and water conservation efforts. They help to combat erosion and stabilize riverbanks.
- 11. **Festivals and Rituals**: It is used for making ceremonial structures, decorations and religious offerings.
- 12. **Traditional Transportation**: Some Naga communities still use bamboo as a mode of transportation, particularly for crossing rivers or carrying goods.
- 13. **Medicinal Uses**: Certain bamboo species are used in traditional medicine in Nagaland for their potential healing properties.
- 14. **Sustainable Resource**: Bamboos grows quickly, which makes it an excellent choice for reforestation and afforestation projects among the local communities.
- 15. **Handicraft Exports**: Bamboo products from Nagaland, including baskets, mats, and other handicrafts, are often exported to other regions and countries, contributing to the local economy.

The Nagaland Bamboo Mission is an initiative undertaken by the State Government aimed at harnessing this immense potential of bamboo as a sustainable resource for economic development.<sup>27</sup> Launched to promote the cultivation, processing, and utilization of bamboo, this mission seeks to empower local communities by creating livelihood opportunities and reducing their dependency on traditional slash-and-burn agriculture. By promoting the growth of bamboo forests and supporting the development of bamboo-based industries, the Mission not only contributes to rural economic growth but also addresses ecological concerns by aiding in forest conservation and carbon sequestration. This endeavor will not only stimulate economic growth but also foster a more environmentally friendly Nagaland.

There are several species of coffea, but the most common and commercially significant ones are Coffea Arabica and Coffea Canephora (also known as Coffea Robusta).

Nagaland has a suitable climate and altitude for coffee cultivation. The coffee grown in Nagaland is primarily of the Arabica variety.

The State Government, along with various agricultural departments, through the universal policies of sustainable farming practices, has been encouraging farmers to take up coffee cultivation as an alternative source of income. The coffee from Nagaland has been gaining recognition for its unique flavour profile and quality.

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

### Nagaland Forest Management Project

Our forests and the immensely rich biodiversity need to be protected and preserved and the Forest Management Project is an important step taken in that direction. Nagaland, which is part of the Indo-Burma biodiversity hotspot is rich in forest resources. The biodiversity of the State is not only treasured for their intrinsic value, but also provides critical ecosystem services. Jhum (slash and burn) cultivation is the major agrarian system, contributing approximately 60% of food production in the State. It is, however, reported that Jhum cycle has been reduced particularly in eastern part of State, and in terms of overall impact, the State has lowest yield per hectare from Jhum Cultivation among the North Eastern states. Thus, restoration and rejuvenation of Jhum areas is essential for the conservation of the State's forest and biodiversity.

The Nagaland Forest Management Project (NFMP), an Externally Aided Project funded by Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), was launched on 1<sup>st</sup> April, 2017 with the objective to improve forest ecosystem and support income generation through rehabilitation of Jhum areas and livelihood support, thereby contributing to sustainable forest and environmental conservation and livelihood improvement.

The broad objectives of NFMP are:

### 1. Strengthening Conservation regime through Community Participation:

Expand areas under tree cover, increase tree density and conserve biodiversity of the state through community participation.

### 2. Livelihood Opportunities for Enhanced Household Incomes through Convergence:

Promote and strengthen livelihood opportunities by enhancing household incomes, encourage convergence, aid food security and improve climate change resilience while reducing pressure on natural resources.

### 3. Institutional Strengthening:

Support extension and strengthening of infrastructure, develop, build and strengthen capacities of communities and institutions.



Medical sciences and research institutes are pivotal in the relentless pursuit of improved healthcare and understanding of diseases. These institutions serve as hubs of innovation, conducting groundbreaking research that ranges from deciphering the fundamental mechanisms of diseases to clinical trials for new treatments and therapies. They play a crucial role in advancing medical knowledge, fostering innovation in healthcare technologies and training the next generation of healthcare professionals.



## Nagaland Beekeeping and Honey Mission (NBHM)

Organic honey, a taste of nature's sweet kiss, A spoonful of healing and goodness, Worked out by the bees, a gift of grace for mankind. **B**esides its role in the kitchen, honey has historical and symbolic importance in various cultures, often representing sweetness, fertility, and even medicinal properties.<sup>30</sup> In recent years, there has been growing interest in locally sourced and raw honey due to potential allergy benefits and the belief that it retains more of its natural nutrients and enzymes compared to processed honey. While selecting honey, it is important to know the different types that are available, such as raw, pasteurized and filtered honey, and to take into consideration personal preferences and dietary requirements.

Nagaland offers a unique apicultural vantage point due to the existence of an age-old beekeeping traditions, abundant bee resources, availability of natural vegetation and an ideal agro- climatic conditions for bees to thrive. As a result, the Government of Nagaland has understood the importance of locally sourced honey and NBHIM was instituted in October, 2007 with a vision to create a road map for the promotion and development of beekeeping and honey enterprise. It is the first mission mode programme launched in the country and the forerunner in the beekeeping and honey sector in the North Eastern Region of India.<sup>31</sup>

#### CHOZU BASA, PHEK DISTRICT

NBHM intervention through Village Beekeeping Committee (VBKC)

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# Samagra Shiksha Abhiyan

An integrated education system is the compass that navigates students through a multidimensional world, equipping them with the tools to explore, connect and thrive in an ever-evolving landscape.

Implemented in Nagaland, the Samagra Shiksha is a Government of India initiative launched in 2018 with the aim to transform the education system in the country. It is an integrated scheme that focuses on treating school education holistically without segmentation from pre-nursery to class 12 and to assimilate vocational learning with general academic education.<sup>32</sup> The scheme is prepared with the broader goal of improving school effectiveness measured in terms of equal opportunities for schooling and equitable learning outcomes as well as incentivizing states to improve the quality of education.

This sector-wide development programme/scheme also helps to harmonize the implementation mechanisms and transaction costs at the state, district and sub district levels, besides envisaging one comprehensive strategic plan for development of school education at the district level.

Samagra Shiksha replaced the Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan (SSA), Rashtriya Madhyamik Shiksha Abhiyan (RMSA) and Teacher Education (TE) programmes, integrating their functions and resources under one umbrella; thereby, helping in streamlining educational efforts and creating a more cohesive education system in India.

Folk songs and dances are used to celebrate various occasions, from agricultural festivals to rituals and ceremonies. Moreover, contemporary music has also found a foothold in Nagaland, with a burgeoning music scene that includes rock, pop, hip-hop and gospel genres. The State's music encapsulates its history, spirituality and cultural identity, serving as a melodious bridge to connect with the outside world.

Art in Nagaland comes with a strong focus on traditional and tribal aesthetics, which includes woodcarving, weaving, pottery, basketry, beadwork, and metalwork. Each of the Naga tribes has its distinct artistic style.

**Woodcarving:** Naga artists carve intricate designs on wooden artifacts, often depicting animals, human figures, and mythological creatures. Wooden sculptures and totem poles are also commonly found in the villages.

**Weaving:** Each tribe has its unique weaving patterns, colors, and motifs. Naga shawls, known as "mekhela" are highly prized and are often used in traditional ceremonies and rituals.

**Pottery and Basketry:** Naga potters create utilitarian and decorative pottery using traditional techniques. Basketry is another important art form and baskets are crafted for various purposes, such as storage, carrying items and as part of traditional dress.

**Beadwork:** Naga women are skilled in beadwork and use intricate bead patterns to create jewelry, clothing and other accessories.

Contemporary Art: In recent years, contemporary Naga artists have been experimenting with new forms and mediums. They blend traditional elements with modern techniques to create unique and innovative artworks. These artists often showcase their work in galleries and exhibitions, both within Nagaland and internationally.







A crucial discipline dedicated to the health, welfare and sustainable management of animals, encompassing everything from medical care to breeding practices.


Naga families have valued livestock as part of their way of life for generations, and its abundance has great symbolic significance for their health and wealth. As such, animal husbandry practices have been playing a pivotal role in supplementing family income and generating employment for the rural poor.<sup>34</sup>

The State's topography, characterized by hills and valleys, presents unique challenges and opportunities for animal husbandry. The Department of Veterinary and Animal Husbandry is dedicated to the health and well-being of livestock, including cattle, poultry, pigs, and other indigenous breeds. Veterinary services extend not only to disease prevention and control but also encompass breeding programs and nutritional interventions. Nagaland's rich cultural heritage, heavily influenced by indigenous practices, is reflected in its approach to animal husbandry, where traditional knowledge is integrated with modern veterinary science. The department works collaboratively with local communities, emphasizing ecological practices that align with the region's biological balance. As Nagaland seeks to strike a balance between modernization and preserving its cultural identity, veterinary and animal husbandry initiatives remain integral to the state's holistic development.






# 34 Youth Resources and Sports



# Zhavame & the Majestic Mount Kapamodzü, Phek District


Peaks piercing the sky and silently guarding the secrets of Nagaland's feral and enchanting wilderness.

**M**ount Kapamodzü, also known as Mount Kapamodzü Peak, is a prominent geographical feature in the Phek district of Nagaland. The elevation of Kapamodzü is approximately 2,500 meters (8,202 feet) above sea level. It offers stunning panoramic views of the surrounding landscape.<sup>35</sup>

Apart from an incredible scenery, rich flora and fauna, the peak offers an outstanding view of Zhavame - the village where it is located. One can also see Nagaland's highest peaks; Mount Saramati and Japfü peak. The Peak remained relatively unknown to people outside the local community for many decades, but over the recent years, it has become one of the most coveted tourist destinations, especially for those who have a strong spirit of adventure.
